As you can imagine, I was in for a shock at university where homework is practically your new job. Luckily, I learned my lesson quickly and started to thrive. I now enjoy the more solitary research aspect of the job as much as I enjoy the more social aspect of teaching, particularly engaging with young curious minds in perpetual formation of new ideas and thoughts.

5. Do you have a favorite Anglican event?

I was Anglica's kopo person as a student and very much enjoyed TYY's kopojaosto and all things study politics. As a staff member, the pub quiz & karaoke night is epic. 6. What do you enjoy doing in your free time?

The apathetic vocals contrasted with all the twinkles and buzzing of the instrumentals create an interesting sound that is hard to find anywhere else. Caroline Loveglow – Strawberry (2022)

The dream pop songs by Caroline Loveglow will have you longing for love. Most of the songs are about love. Whether it be the love that got away or the one you are just falling in. The sound is reminiscent of the band Beach House but Loveglow manages to put a pop twist on it to make it sound like her own thing. Songs like “Patience Etc.” and “Foxy” will surely make you shake your ass while you yearn for love.

Evian Christ – Revanchist (2023)

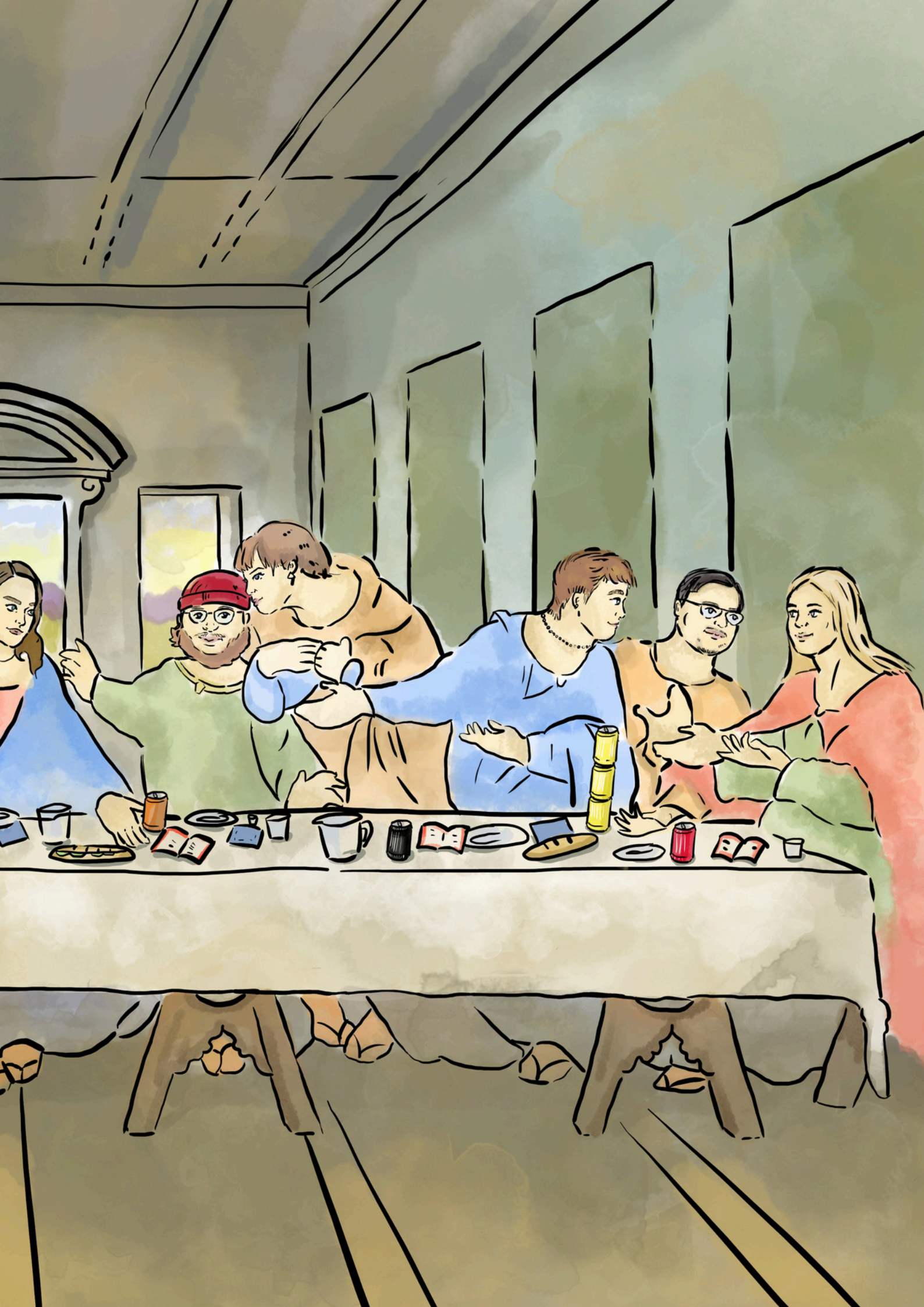
Oklou – Choke Enough (2025)

SEOUL SEARCHING: TWO UNFORGETTABLE EXCHANGE EXPERIENCES

Where were you on exchange?

University of Seoul, Seoul,

How did you adapt to a foreign country with a foreign language?

“My Korean level was fairly elementary when I arrived and this made some things harder in my day-to-day life since many people in Korea don’t speak English. Even then, I found that most things could be solved one way or another, even without a shared language! I found myself adapting to Korean culture fairly easily, but I did feel a little homesick the entire time I was there.” – Havu

“South Korea as a culture was already quite familiar to me, and I had studied Korean before, so I found it fairly easy to adapt to the new environment. However, I was really lucky with a lot of things, for example with receiving a spot at the dorm and being surrounded by a closely-knit exchange student community that made adapting much smoother. I do recommend learning at least a little bit of the language of the country you’re going to, it makes adapting so much easier!” – Elina

What did you study on exchange and how was it?

“I studied mainly English in South Korea too. Some of my friends who had different majors couldn’t study their subject in Korea, but English was available since the courses are – you know – in English. The courses had a similar level of difficulty as the ones here, but involved a lot more homework. Attendance was also mandatory to a much higher degree than in Finland – more than two absences during the entire semester would result in an automatic fail. I still found the courses pretty manageable, and ended up getting 4s and 5s in all of them!” – Havu

“My university allowed exchange students to only take a few courses, so I had only four courses for the spring semester. I took courses mostly related to my Korean language studies and East Asian studies, and I found them all very manageable. Depending on your goals and interests, you can maneuver with the courses and choose easier or more difficult ones! (You didn’t hear this from me ok but I recommend going on exchange for the experience, not for the studies)” – Elina

What was your living situation like whilst on exchange?

“I didn’t get a spot in my university’s dorm, so I had to find accommodation elsewhere. I decided to live in a small apartment that I found through Airbnb. Rent was costlier when renting through Airbnb (as opposed to renting the traditional way), but there was no move in fees so I found it to be a good option. I kept my apartment in Finland during the exchange as well, but had a subtenant and therefore didn’t have to pay rent back home.”

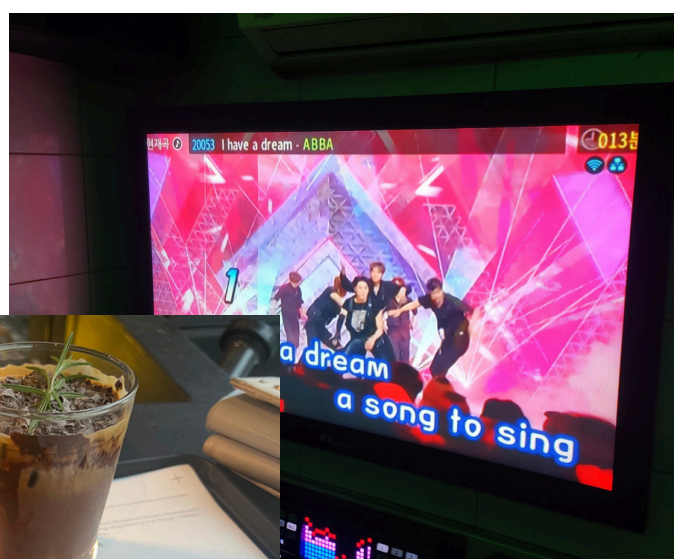

“I received a spot at my university’s dormitory, and for me it was a great choice. The dorm room was very small and shared with another student. I heard horror stories of some people’s roommates, but I was super lucky to get a Greek roommate who ultimately became one of my best friends! So, the dorm was very hit-or-miss but if you’re the kind of person who can in general handle a bit of discomfort, the dorm is a cost-efficient and practical option.” – Elina

How did you find the bar / club culture in Korea?

“There were all kinds of bars and loads of them at that. Really something for everyone, and some of them had very interesting concepts and decor! The bars were a great place to hang out with friends, especially since most of us exchange students didn’t have a lot of space in our accommodation. Clubbing in Korea was also fun and quite different than in Finland, but if you present as female, you have to be really careful in clubs.” – Havu

“What can I say, it’s great and hectic at the same time. Sometimes the clubs are so packed that you can’t move at all, but hey, the vibes are often immaculate and usually you don’t have to pay to enter. Someone told me on my very first day in Seoul to “never pay for the entrance NOR drinks at a club” and that was honestly one of the best pieces of advice I received.” – Elina



What is something you miss about South Korea?

“Photobooths!! I loved taking photos with my friends every time we hung out, they were truly everywhere in Korea! Sometimes there are still days where I would kill for a cheeky photobooth photo to put on my fridge.” – Havu

“There is a lot to miss but I would have to say I miss the karaoke rooms and the convenience store culture. You could eat every single meal at the convenience store, grab affordable drinks from there and head straight to the 노래방 (noraebang). God I love me some karaoke...” – Elina

What would you say to someone considering going on exchange in general?

“Do it! My semester abroad was honestly one of the best experiences in my life and I would definitely recommend it for everyone! Going to Korea helped me grow as a person and helped me to become more independent. Although – it was also really hard at times and I missed home a lot.” – Havu

“I wholeheartedly concur with Havu on this one, going on exchange changed my life for good, for the better. On exchange you get to leave your comfort zone, make new friends and learn new languages. Even if you don’t get accepted to your number one destination, if only you have the resources to go, living in another country for 6 months or a year will do you good, I promise.” – Elina

FIFTY-NINE PAGES OF SUGGESTIONS.

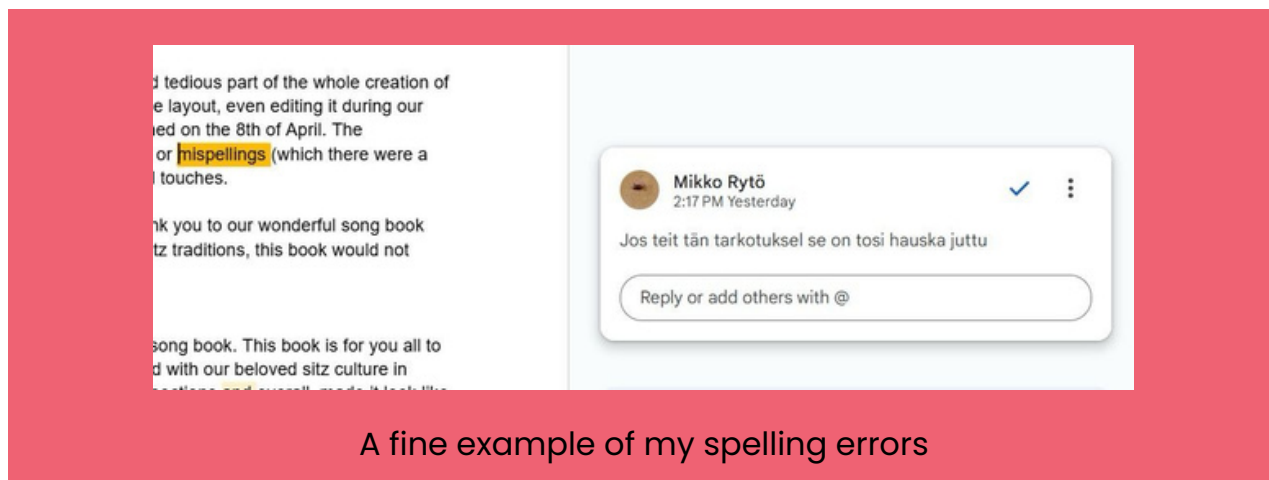

We chose all new songs carefully with our beloved sitz culture in mind. We added some fun illustrations, renamed some sections and, overall, made it look like the Anglica of today.

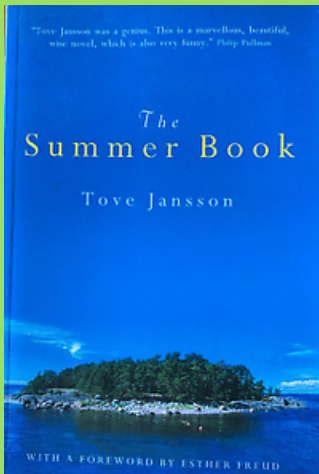
So hold the book close, scribble heartfelt messages (or gibberish) into your friends' books, check out the new songs and sing your heart out.

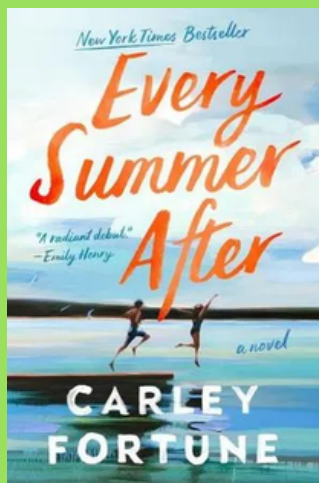


Classic

Where to read: By the water

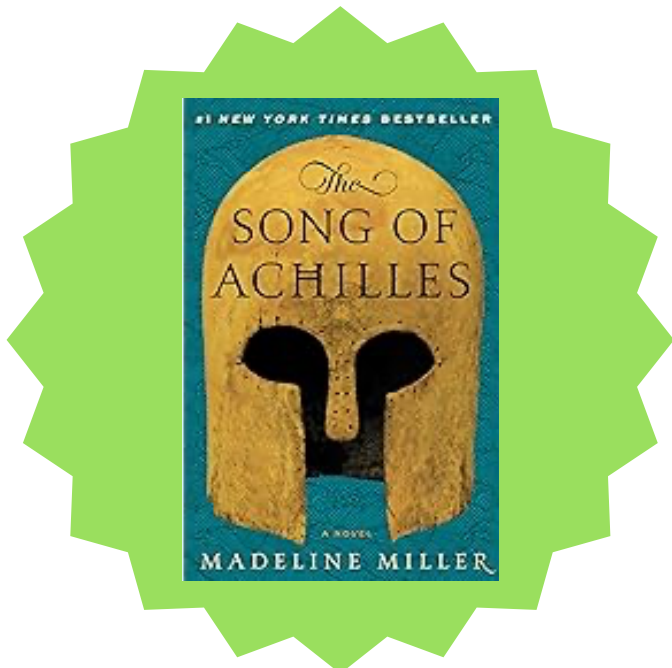


Mystery

Where to read: Outdoors while lying in the sun

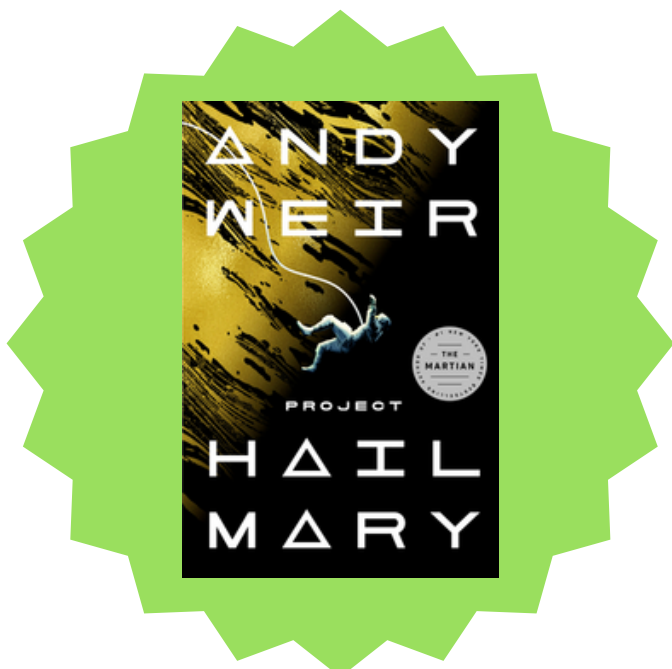


Fantasy

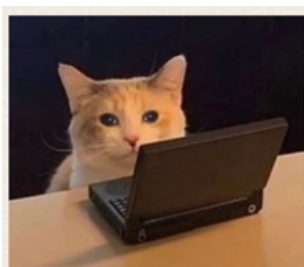

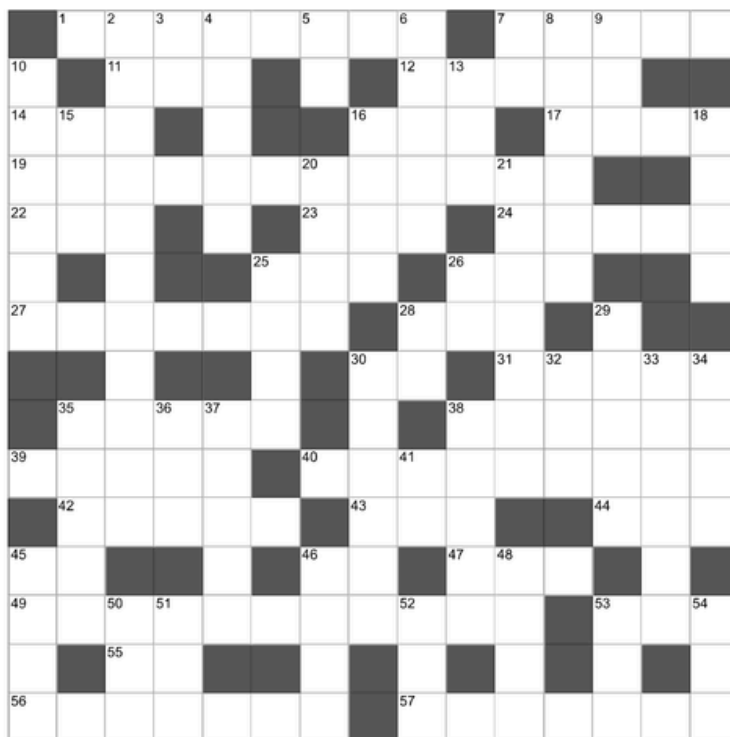

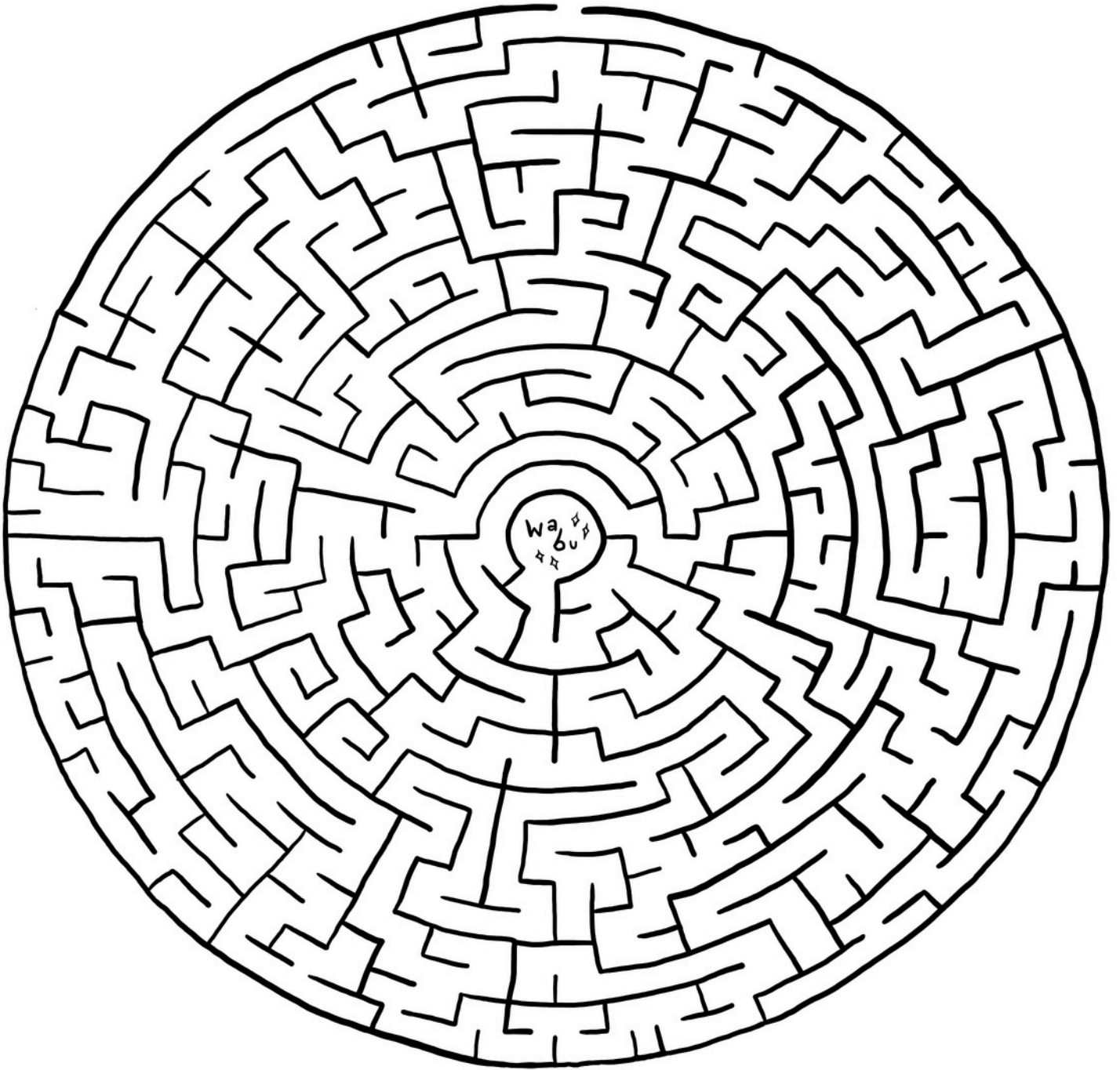
